She has not only been a superb mentor to her team at PGE, but she has exemplified the attributes that are being recognized by this award.

Julie brings several key attributes to all her work. First is a respect for science and scientific inquiry as being central to the policy decisions we make in the hydroelectric industry. By bringing the best science we can muster to the table, we establish an atmosphere of openness, honesty and true problem solving. But Julie also demonstrates that natural resource decisions must respect those who have an economic stake in the outcome. In representing PGE's customers at the negotiating table, Julie represents not only their environmental aspirations, but also their economic realities.

The other attribute that I find so compelling about Julie is her unflagging willingness to take one more try, to examine one more option, and to develop one more alternative, to attain durable solutions to seemingly intractable business and natural resource dilemmas.
